There are some great parks and open spaces in the London Borough of Richmond upon Thames.

We have put together some ideas to help you and your school to make the most of Richmond's green spaces and to encourage you to spend more time learning in them.

Outdoor learning is an approach to teaching. It is about making the most of the world around you and allowing children to learn through what they do, what they discover and what they encounter. It allows pupils to develop an understanding of the place that they learn in. It is about taking your curriculum and teaching it outside.

Choose a park or open space within walking distance to school. It can be big or small, covered in trees or open. Get to know it and assess its

In addition to supporting the curriculum outdoor learning allows children get to know their local area and gives them

direct contact with an open space which they can later visit with their families. Children will be encouraged to develop the habit of walking and have direct contact and access to nature.

Collecting objects from the park

When collecting objects from the park it is important to set some ground rules. These might include the following:

Set boundaries for the distance that the children can go scavenging in and ensure that they are supervised by an adult.

At the end of the activity objects should be left in the park for others to enjoy.

Do not pick up anything that will not fit in the palm of your hand.

Do not pick up anything which might injure you or anyone else in any way – anything sharp, or heavy must not be collected.

If you find something that you are not sure about ask an adult.

Do not collect anything that is alive or might damage plants or the environment.

Be sure to wash your hands when you return to school.
