Support for Disadvantaged Individuals

Participants are often traumatised, isolated, lonely, and lack confidence.

Creating a Safe Space

- Provide a safe space for Hong Kongers to connect, share concerns, and improve overall well-being.
- Navigating mainstream services, learning English, and engaging in confidence-building and health-improving activities.

Cultural Integration and Celebration

- Focus on older Hong Kongers who face greater isolation due to language and mobility barriers.
- Organising cultural events to celebrate traditions, helping participants feel welcome and integrate faster into the local community.

Who can apply

- Support sanctuary seekers and their families in Richmond
- Constituted not-for-profit organisations
- Three trustees/directors
- Financially viable (credit check)
- We don't fund:
 - Schools/PTAs
 - Religious or political purposes
 - Fundraising
 - Existing activity is a low priority



Definition of sanctuary seekers

Sanctuary Seekers are taken to include:

- Anyone who has experienced forced migration in the past 5 years.
 - Asylum seekers
 - Refugees
 - Those seeking asylum and those who have recently received refugee status.
 - Unaccompanied Asylum Seeking Children.
 - Those on Government resettlement schemes including the Afghan programmes (ARAP/ACRS), Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme, and UK Resettlement Scheme.
 - Those on the Homes for Ukraine, Ukraine Family, or Ukraine Extension scheme.
- Initiatives that work with other groups which may reasonably be considered as sanctuary seekers may be considered.



Borough of Sanctuary Grant Scheme

- The Borough of Sanctuary Grant Scheme provides grants of up to £10,000 to undertake activities for six to twelve months.
- Larger grants may be considered in exceptional circumstances where a clear need can be demonstrated
 - There is a clear need for longer funding
 - The project addresses a niche issue and funding certainty is required
 - The project is particularly innovative.



Priorities

Priority one: Education, employment and training - Emphasising the need to equip sanctuary seekers with the skills necessary to access opportunities and thrive in their new home.

Priority two: Wellbeing - Supporting activities which promote refugees' and asylum seekers' wellbeing

Priority three: Advocacy and advice - Beginning a life in a new country can be difficult. This priority emphasises the need to support sanctuary seekers to navigate systems in the UK.

Priority four: Refugees and Asylum Seekers – Promoting the contribution sanctuary seekers make to the borough and/or that further efforts for community integration.



Applying for funding

Applications should be made before the deadline. They will then be reviewed by a panel and decisions on funding made in February 2025

Our grants


In 23/24 we made grants worth £2.7m:







- Be of a non-commercial nature (except for events or advertising sponsored by the Council or its approved agencies)
- Not directly promote a religious cause speakers or sales of work in religious venues should be considered as community events
- Not be likely to cause offence to public taste and decency.

Local community or resident groups, charities or not for profit organisations can apply to display information about an event or opportunity that people in the area would be interested in.


