Friendly Parks for All: project aims

The Friendly Parks for All project aims to get more people visiting parks in Richmond and to understand the barriers to spending time in parks. Other aims include:

- Improving opportunities to engage with parks for residents to enjoy by improving access for people that face barriers to spending time in parks.
- Promoting the benefits of engaging with the natural environment for health and wellbeing especially for groups who have identified inequalities and face barriers to accessing these spaces.
- Providing tailored interventions that address these identified inequalities to address barriers to access and inequalities.

All Ability Cycling in Kneller Gardens

The project has been developing the offer of free All Ability Cycling again this year. There have been sessions for adults every 2 weeks since March working in partnership with RISE disability sports and inclusive activities (part of the council Sports Development team) and Bikeworks CIC. The project has also delivered a series of family activities during the school holidays for those families who want to cycle together or have a child with a disability who needs an adapted cycle.

The project, funded by the Crane Fund, has bought adapted bikes for use, some of these are pictured here. This means that the initiative can be carried on beyond the life of the funding. The team is recruiting volunteers to support the project in the long term, who will receive training and support.

Improving access to parks for blind and visually impaired park users in Kneller Gardens

The consultation in 2020 into the use of parks in the borough with people who are blind or visually impaired and ongoing work with disabled groups has allowed the project team to make several amendments to Kneller Gardens to ensure that it was suitable for their use. The most recent improvement was the installation of a tree trail in the park developed with RNIB and in consultation with blind/visually impaired park users. The trails comprises:

- 12 posts with an interpretation panel that includes a description of the trees, facts about the species, and related facts about the biodiversity, history and culture related to the tree species or individual tree.
- Each post has a plate with an image of the leaf and fruit for each of the species that can be used to take rubbings using a crayon but can also be used by people who are blind or have visual impairments.
- The name of the tree in raised text and in braille.
- There is a related map and leaflet which shows the location of each of the trees and the text of the information panels. The font size of this leaflet is larger than the font size on the panel. The leaflet is available on the council website to be downloaded.

Feedback has been positive from both park users and those who work with people who are blind or visually impaired. A blind / deaf park user said that she had never seen anything similar and was very excited to revisit and do the full trail with her carer and her friends in the future. She was easily able to read the braille and enjoyed feeling the raised image of the leaves and fruit. She also enjoyed feeling the texture of the tree leaves in comparison to the outline of the leaf on the image.

A park user commented "I was so very delighted and impressed. I particularly like the braille which allows blind people to interact too - I had a blind sister which made me very aware of what blind people miss out on." The Middlesex Association for the Blind commented "I love these new developments and I am sure our service users would be delighted to learn more."

There has also been very positive feedback from park users

- I love them, I've read them all, brightened up my evening walks!
- Great idea, I often wonder what the more unusual trees are and now I know.

Other features in the park designed for people who are blind or visually impaired include a sculpture and sensory garden installed and planted by the Richmond Green Gym in 2024. There is now an information board in place which explains more about the sculpture, it contains a plaque in braille.

Many of the learnings from this project will be used when designing future Friendly Parks for All projects – the development of access guides, contrasting colour for park equipment, the need for benches in quiet spaces, benches of different height and the use of different media to guide people around the parks will all be used in future projects.



River Crane restoration

This summer 137 water voles were successfully reintroduced to Crane Park.

The two-year long project began with wetland habitat restoration and culminated in the release of captive-bred water voles along a 1km stretch of river and riparian habitat. More information: <u>https://www.richmond.gov.uk/news/news_august_2</u> 024/help_protect_crane_park_water_voles

The project at Meadway Orchard in Twickenham is still open for referrals from social care and health organisations, although TCV no longer support the Richmond Green Gym.

Let's Go Outside and Learn CIC took on the support of the group in March 2024 with funding from Richmond Council. There are plans to develop the group further by teaching conservation and food growing skills, developing intergenerational projects and rewarding participants for participation so that they can evidence engagement with the project and new skills.



Cambridge Gardens - Developing a Friendly Park with Mencap Richmond.





The parks team are working with Mencap in Cambridge Gardens, East Twickenham to create a new Friendly Park for All. A new outdoor gym will be installed following consultation with the Working Together Group and the group has worked with us to design a food growing area and sensory garden with seating for a section of the park adjacent to the tennis courts which overlooks the river Thames. It is hoped that this can be installed over the autumn /winter for use next year.

An access guide for the park has been completed for the park and is available on the parks website.



Richmond health bus visits parks Autumn 2024

The Richmond Health Bus will be visiting parks this autumn. They started with Kneller Gardens on 13th September from 10am-4pm. It is an opportunity for park users to have a chat with a local health expert for tips on staying healthy and active, and support to stop smoking. The visit coincided with the monthly lunches and bingo for older people organised by the Friends of Kneller Gardens and Youth Enterprises who run the park

A new accessible path for Crane Park Island

The main hard path on London Wildlife Trust's Crane Park Island in Whitton, leading from the entrance by the Tower in Crane Park to the concrete platform at the north end of the island with a lovely view of the river, has been improved this year with the replacement of tapping rails and a thin layer of shingle to stabilize parts that were getting very muddy in winter after rain. All the work was done by volunteers, and we hope that it will make an better path for those who don't walk as easily as they used to or use a wheelchair or buggy. The work was funded by the Crane Valley Partnership Community Fund. Do come to Crane Park and try it and let us know what you think.
