## Working together to drive equality

- ❑ Richmond Council is committed to working with its voluntary sector partners to deliver equality for all residents across the borough.

# Engaging more effectively to deliver equality in service delivery

Engaging with VCS organisations can help the Council to base their policies on evidence rather than on assumptions, thereby improving decision making, and helping them to make the best use of public money.

Over 75% of VCS deliver public services where they are based, often in areas and to diverse communities that local councils find harder to reach and engage with.

The Council's commissioning approach includes advancing our equalities work and this is reflected in the design of our service specifications.

RCVS, as the infrastructure organisation for the VCS is also committed to supporting the sector in promoting equalities in its service provision

# Richmond CVS is committed to:

- Considering equality, diversity and inclusion within our own service delivery, operations and governance.
- Supporting the sector to consider equality, diversity and inclusion as they develop and deliver projects and services, and within their operations and at board level.

## Our equality duties

- ❑ The Public Sector Equality Duty applies to both the Council and the VCS when carrying out public functions and delivering services across local communities.

## Socio-economic status – going beyond the protected characteristics

Since 2023 the Council also treats the socio-economic duty in the same way as the existing protected characteristics. This means we consider the effects of the Council's decisions and policies on a number of groups who may be economically disadvantaged:

- Those who live in relatively more deprived areas.
- Low-income groups and unemployed people.
- Carers.
- Care experienced people.
- Single parents.
- Those with Health inequalities.
- Those with Refugee status.

# Intersectionality

- ❑ As well as the individual protected characteristics we also try to be aware of how they can intersect.
- ❑ The term intersectionality is widely used to explain the interaction between discrimination, whether it's based on gender, race, age, class, sexual identity, religion, or more.
- ❑ It can be used to explain the experiences of people with more than one protected characteristic, and how they can intersect and interact (E.g. when racism and transphobia are both directed towards the same person).

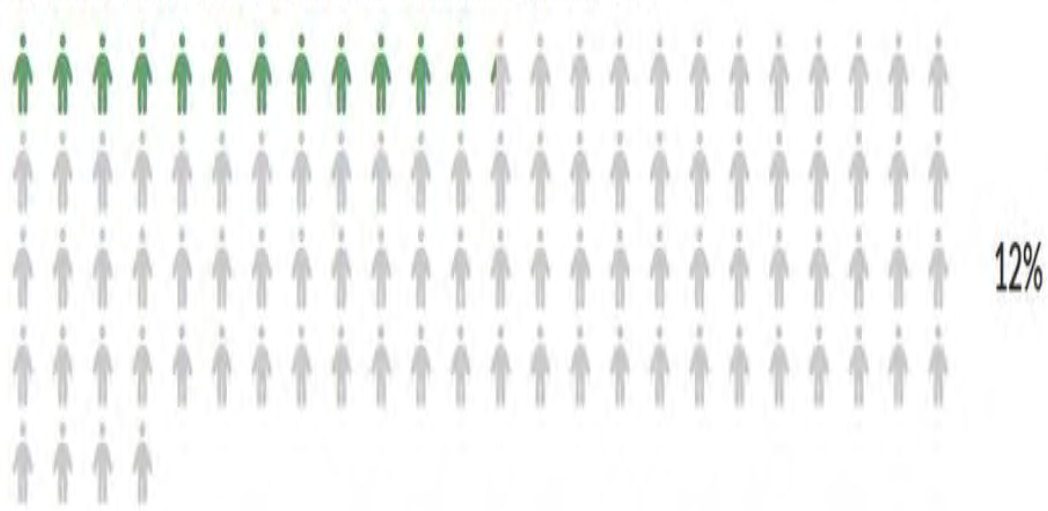


Selected level of disability by ward



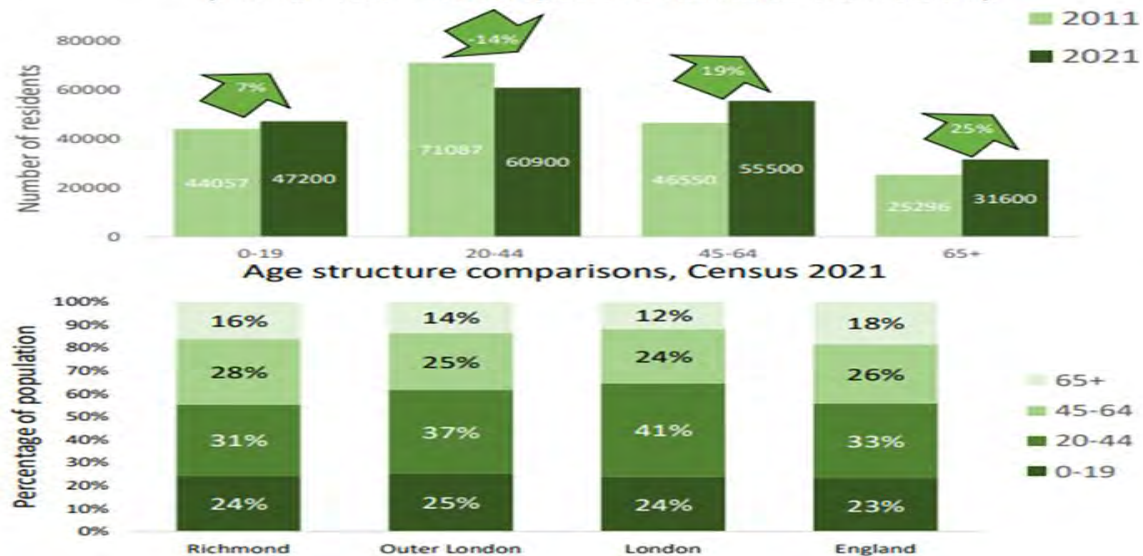

One person households: Aged 66 years and over rate for Richmond upon Thames (2021)



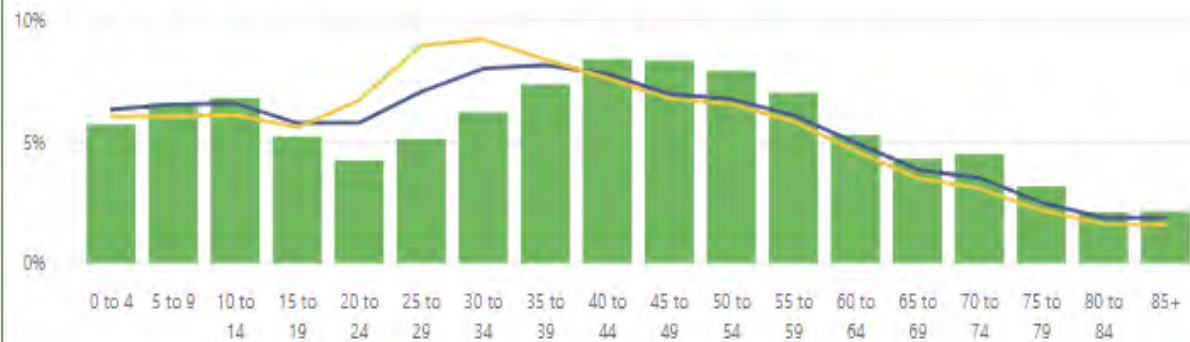
Age breakdown with percentage change between 2021 and 2011 Census population

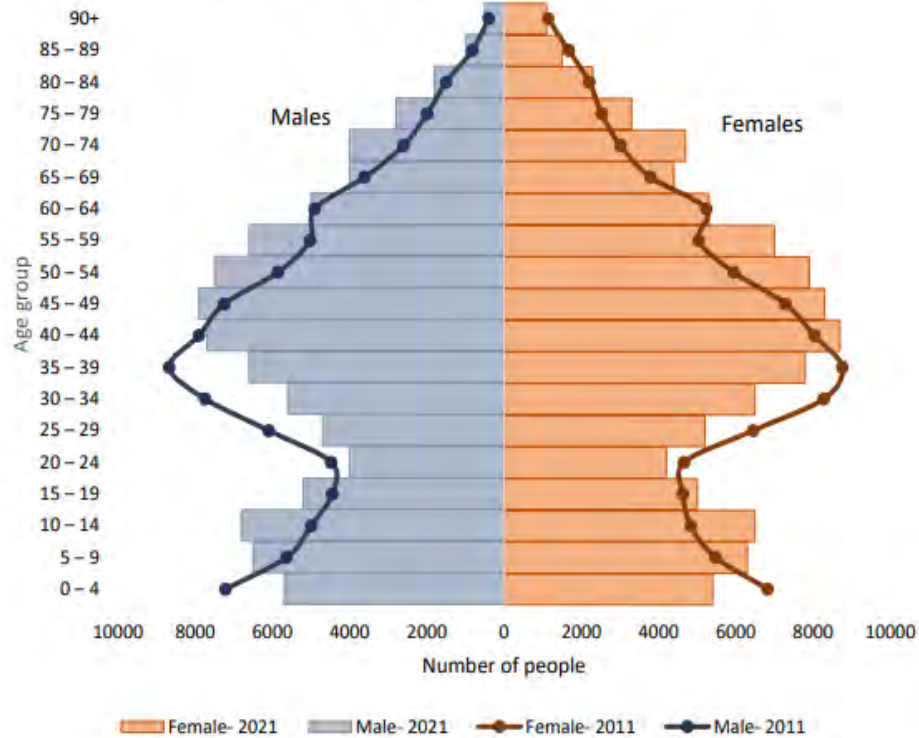

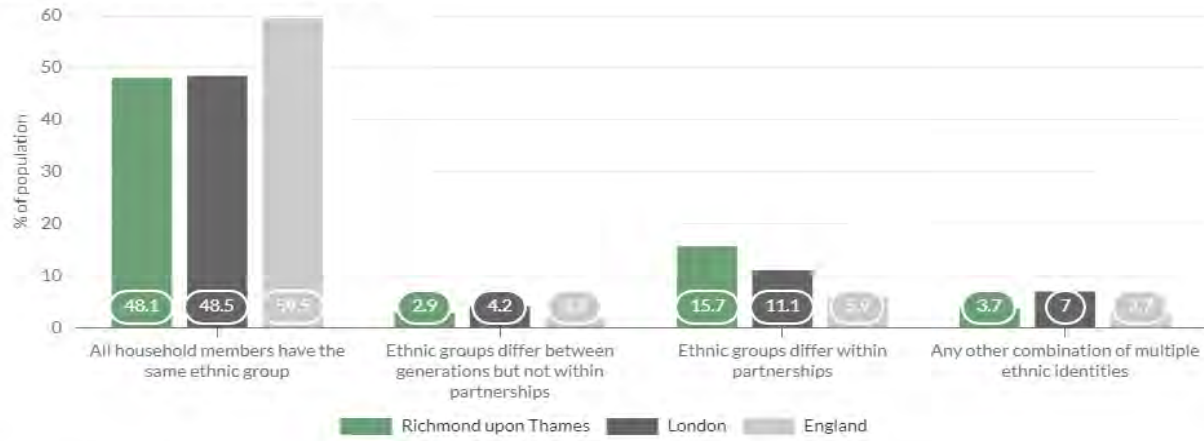

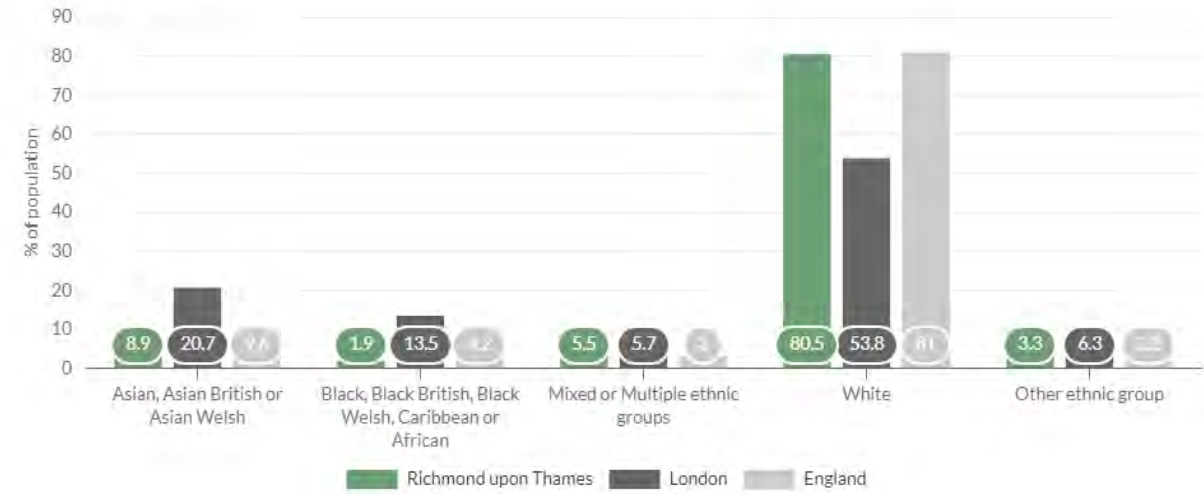

Ethnic groups of household members (2021)

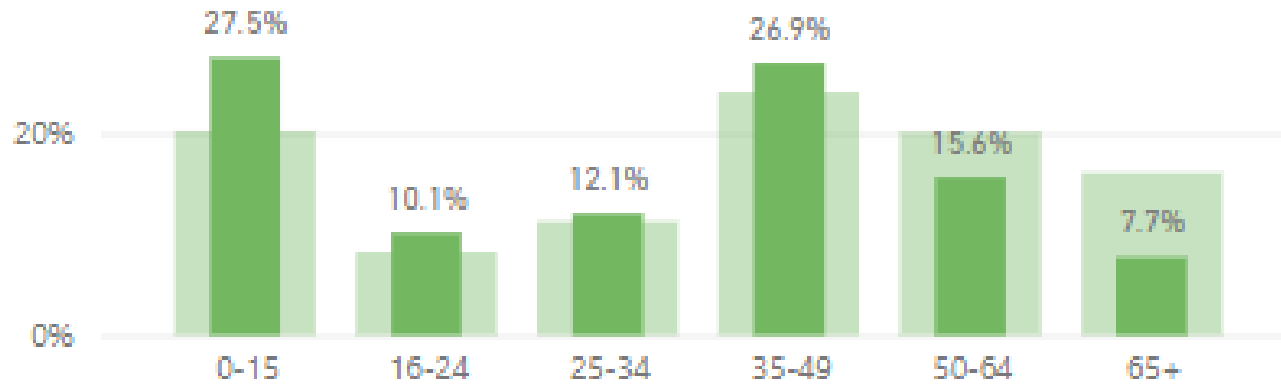

PROPORTION OF SELECTED POPULATION BY GENDER IDENTITY



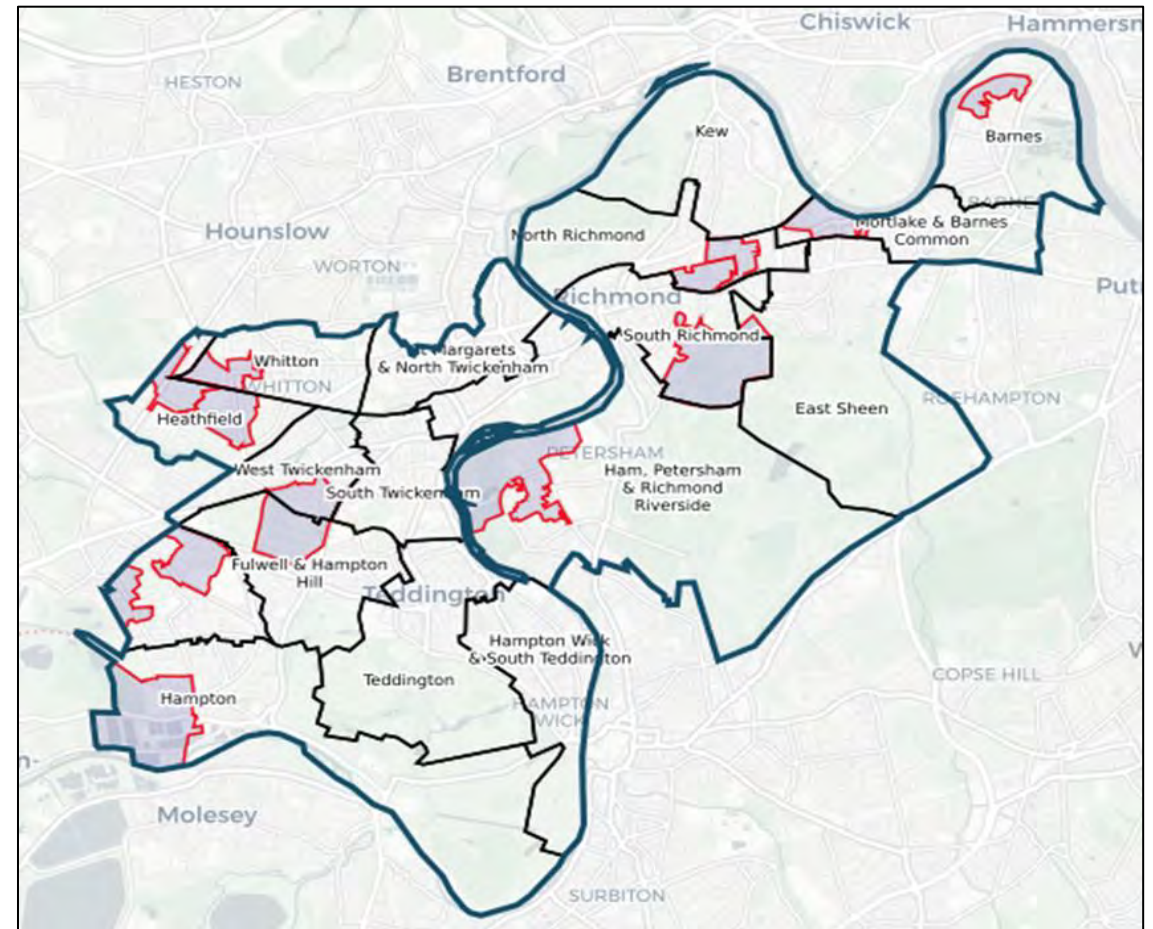
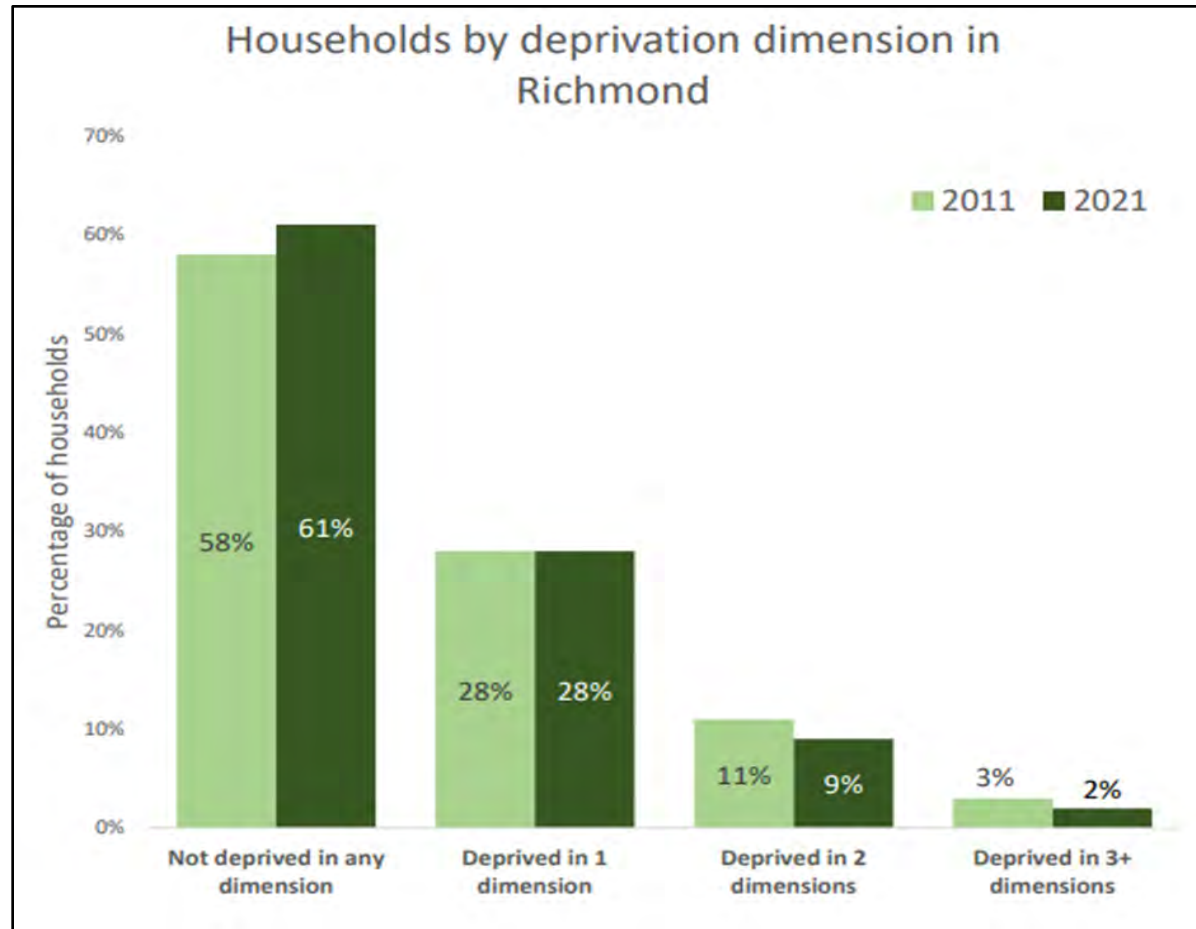

# Pregnancy & Maternity

- In 2021 there were 2,422 conceptions in Richmond borough – an annual conception rate of 65 per 1000 women.
- This is lower than the conception rate for London (70.8 per 1000) and the rate for England (71.5 per 1000) (Census, 2021).
- Of all the English regions and Wales, London has seen the biggest fall in conception rates over the last decade, decreasing by 20.9% since 2011.
- Under 18 conceptions have also fallen in Richmond in the last decade and London had the lowest of all the English regions and Wales.

# Single Parents

- ❑ The 2021 census data found that 8.8% of children in Richmond live in a single parent household in comparison to 13.3% across London.
- ❑ Around 9% of households are lone parent households with dependent children. High concentrations can be seen in Ham, Hampton North and Heathfield.
- ❑ Lone parent households in Richmond (8.8%) have increased by +1% points since 2011. Among lone parent families, over half had dependent children.
- ❑ The proportion of lone parent households in Richmond is one of the smallest in London and is lower than Outer London (13.4%), London (13.3%) and England (11.1%).

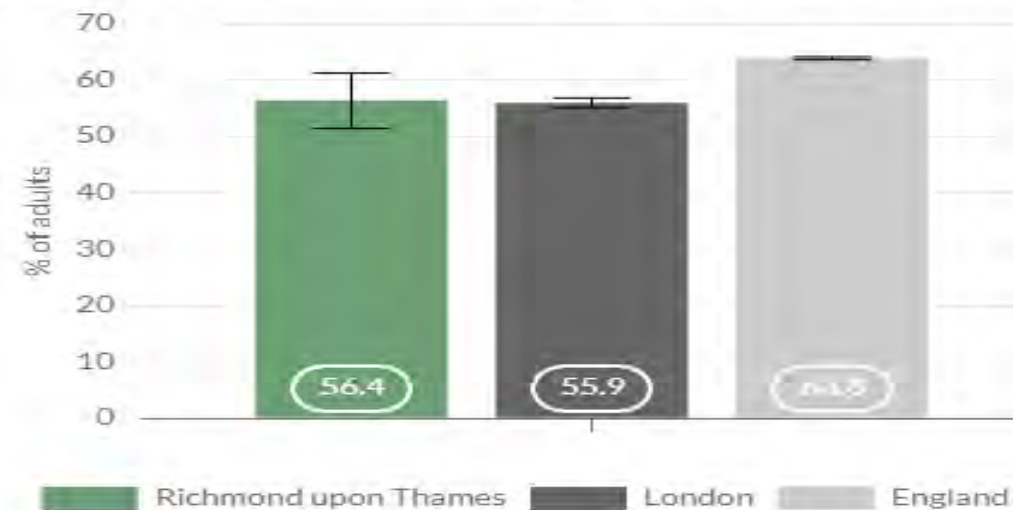

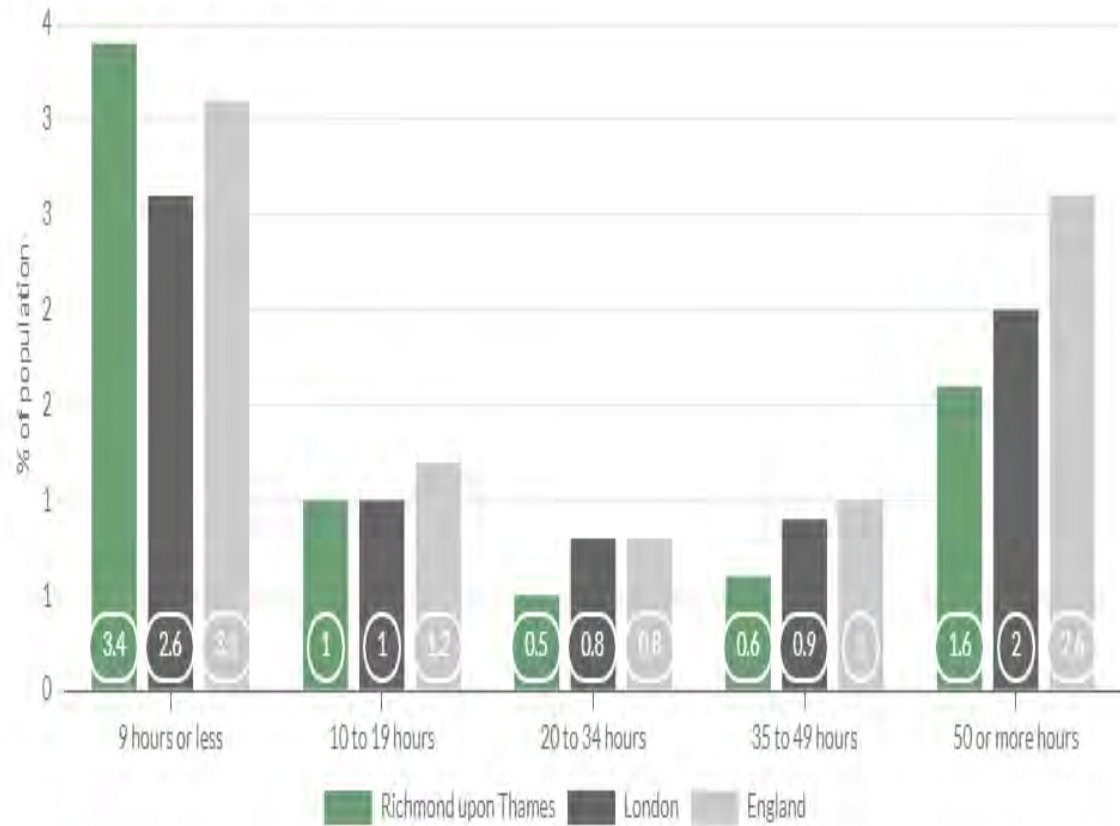

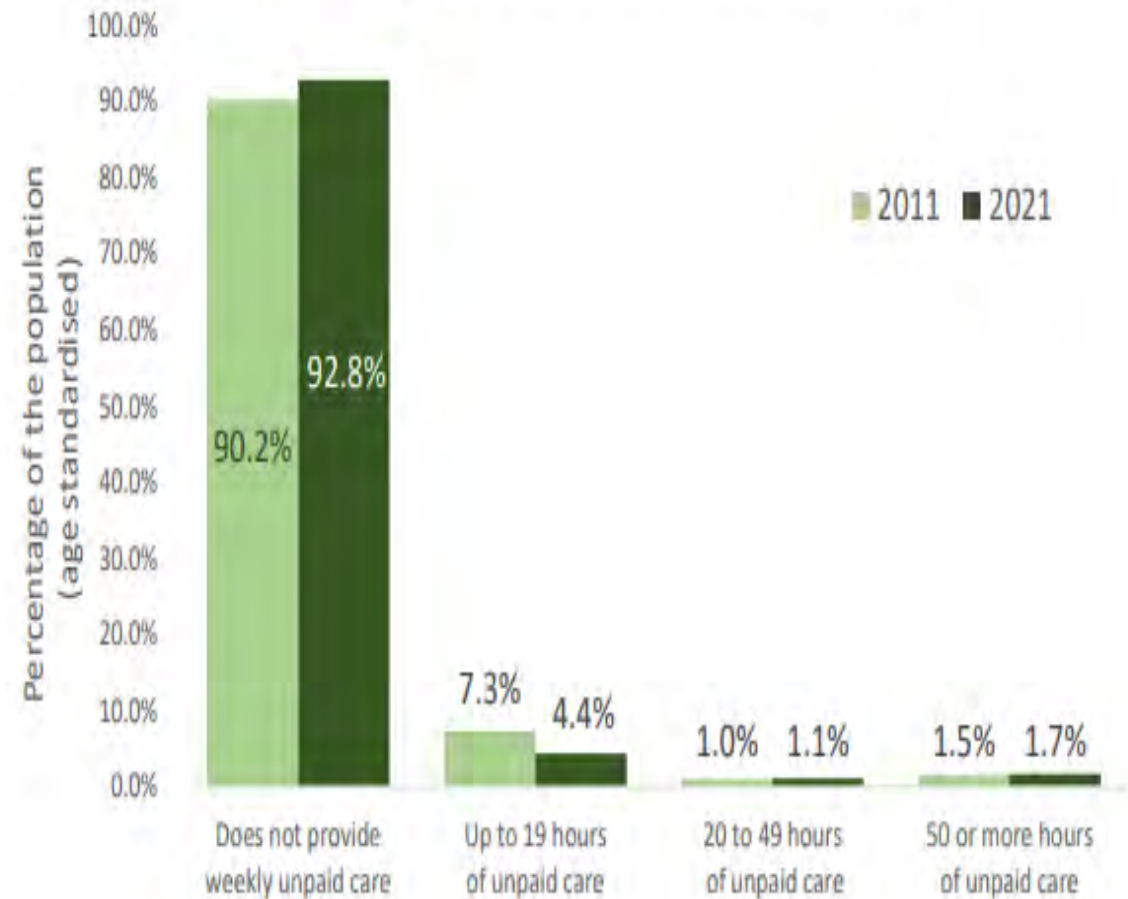

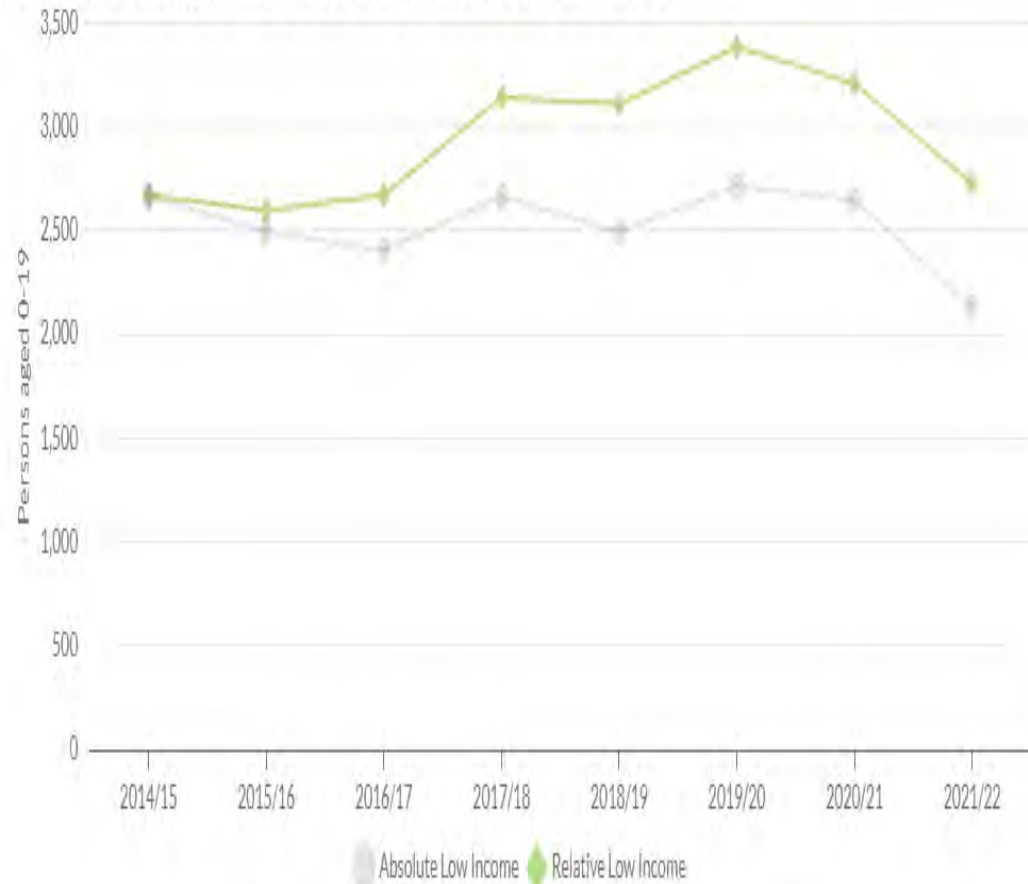

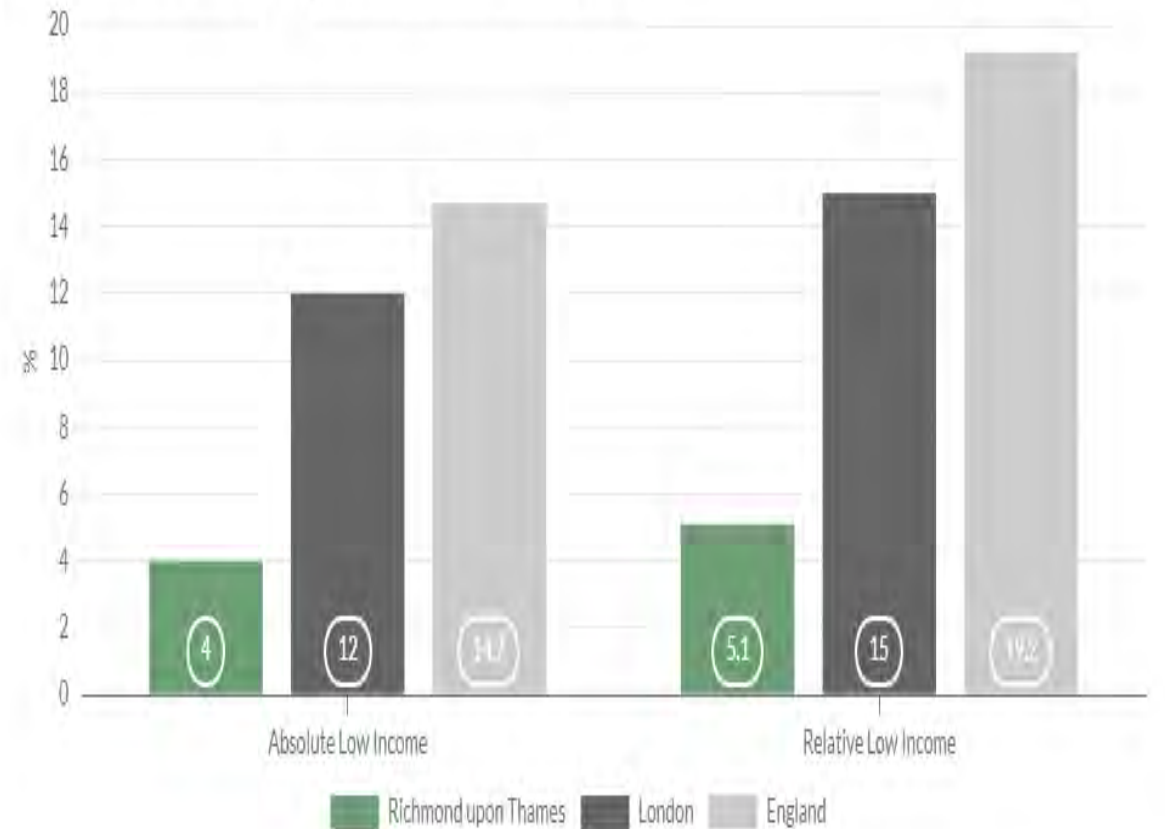

## Background

- Richmond Furniture Exchange was established in 1990
- Registered charity in 1992
- Changed its name in 1997 to the **Richmond Furniture Scheme**
- From 1st April 2010 the assets of the Scheme were transferred to Richmond Furniture Scheme, a newly formed company limited by guarantee and registered as a charity
- We have eight trustees with a mix of IT, marketing, third sector and finance experience.
