Business Contribution in the Community

Local businesses that have demonstrated commitment to their area.

- Prosperity Café & Restaurant For their vast support of Ukrainian refugees in the borough, turning their café into a donation hub and partnering with many members of the community to set up the Ukrainian Social Club, which provides critical support to those new to our borough and celebrates Ukrainian culture in Richmond.
- David McGeachie Property Sales For his wide-ranging support of community events and projects that benefit residents, including big events that bring the community together like the St Margaret's Fair and Twickenham Riverside Music Festival.
- Sceon + Berne For their regular support of local groups and charities, including Meet Up Mondays at the Hare and the Hound pub, to help combat social isolation among older residents.

Communities Together

Groups, charities or organisations that connect people, break down existing barriers or make Richmond upon Thames a fairer, more inclusive borough.

- Shapla Rahman For going the extra mile to support the families who attend Jellie Tots Pre-School, from using spare time to fundraise for new equipment, to bringing in food for pupils and supporting the school's ability to offer services to as wide a community as possible.
- Teddington Community Cafe For the work of volunteers to provide a safe space for people across the borough to enjoy new and old company, a warm drink and homemade treats, an important resource within the community following periods of increased social isolation.
- Multicultural Richmond For championing inclusivity and community across the borough, most recently by providing volunteer-led English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) courses for Ukrainian refugees in the borough, as well as add-on activities to bring community to them and help them settle in.

Groups that exemplify what can be done to make a difference when people work together.

- **GoodGym Richmond** For the tireless work of volunteer runners, cyclists and walkers, who carried out hundreds of wide-ranging good deeds over countless hours within the community through 2022, as well as supporting day to day work and projects run by local groups and charities in the borough.
- Richmond Talking Newspaper For reliably providing weekly local and community news in audio form for visually impaired residents of the borough via a dedicated team of volunteers who record, produce and publish each issue – including a mailing service for those who would like to receive recordings on a memory stick via post.
- Whitton Network For providing volunteer support and a helping hand to the elderly, disabled and vulnerable in our borough through valuable befriending and transportation services.

Community Project of the Year

Projects that have improved our borough and its local communities – run by individuals, groups or voluntary organisations.

- Ruils & Cambridge Park Bowls Club For creating a positive and inclusive environment by partnering together to bring the sport of bowls to people who are disabled, have mental health challenges and are experiencing loneliness and isolation, which has helped members to learn new skills, make friends and share experiences.
- Marble Hill Revived Project For the effort of volunteers to join together and transform the gardens at Marble Hill House and surrounding parkland, which included taking care of and nourishing newly planted trees and flowerbeds and making the space an enjoyable and accessible space for the community.
- Refugees Welcome in Richmond Ukrainian Support Group For the work of volunteers to create a safe space and community of support for Ukrainian refugees arriving and settling into the borough, including help to secure work and access helpful local services, as well as support to local hosts.
- Friends of Kneller Gardens & Young Peoples Enterprise Limited's KG Cafe For the new KG Café initiative, which provides subsidised hot lunches and bingo games for older residents in the borough, helping to combat social isolation and providing a space for forging new friendships in a beautiful and accessible area.

Environmental Award

For individuals, projects and groups specifically focused on tackling environmental issues.

- The Real Junk Food Project For their pioneer work in helping to reduce food waste and feed the community by collecting surplus food 7 days a week from local businesses, retailers, individuals and allotments and redistributing it back into the community, educating people along the way about the impact our food choices have on the environment. They were also chosen as a shortlisted nominee in this year's Community Group of the Year category.
- **Richmond Furniture Scheme** For supporting the practice of and sharing skills around re-use and recycling among residents, taking old furniture and upcycling it to save it from landfill and redistribute it back into the community.
- **Rashadee Miller** For her dedicated work at Vine Road Community Growing Project, bringing together local volunteers to help produce organic compost, share knowledgeable skills with young people and grow food that benefits families through the Richmond Food Network.
